## Oral statement submitted by VIDES International – International Volunteerism Organization for Women, Education and Development

VIDES on behalf of this coalition welcomes the Philippines' participation in the UPR.

We commend the Philippines' acceptance of recommendation 145.19<sup>1</sup>, which highlights the ongoing efforts to strengthen the legislation, awareness-raising, and training of government officers in **combating online abuse and exploitation of children**. We welcome the State's acceptance of recommendations 136<sup>2</sup> and 144<sup>3</sup> to expand access to **quality education** for youth in disadvantaged situations, particularly girls.

## We recommend to *increase budget allocations to ensure children's access to quality education, prioritizing gaps in school infrastructure; recruitment,*

## training and adequate salaries for teachers; and provision of textbooks and educational materials.

Moreover, we remain concerned about **child labor**, with approximately two million and ninety-seven thousand child laborers in the Philippines, according to ILO<sup>4</sup>. We hereby call on the state to:

- 1. Continue efforts to strengthen councils for the protection of children by integrating child protection-related measures with specific action plans, monitoring and accountability systems.
- 2. Promote decent and safe working opportunities for children who are legally allowed to work, and to provide vocational and technical training to increase job skills and entrepreneurial opportunities for them.
