IIMA, on behalf of this NGO coalition, welcomes this biennial panel on young people's role in fostering peaceful societies.

Youth are vital partners in building a just and peaceful society, yet they are **often excluded** from **decisions** that affect them, denying communities the energy, innovation, and leadership they offer in promoting human rights and peace.

Education empowers them to engage fully and drive social transformation; whereas its **absence undermines** their potential as active peacebuilders. Young people - particularly those in contexts

of poverty, conflict, displacement and discrimination - face barriers in their access to human rights, with girls and young women disproportionately affected.

How can we achieve sustainable peace, if we do not educate and empower youth to strive for it?

Ensuring youth access to rights is a **strategic investment** in the **resilience** and **stability** of societies as empowered youth will certainly challenge injustice, resolve conflicts peacefully, and advocate for inclusive societies.

We urge Member States to:

- 1. Remove barriers to youth participation in all decision-making processes.
- 2. Guarantee quality education and Human Rights Education for all young people, as means to unlock their potential as peacebuilders.
- 3. Protect and systematically mainstream youth rights through existing UN Human Rights mechanisms, especially the UPR and the Treaty Bodies.
