Democracy and climate change: focusing on solutions

IIMA is honored to take the floor on behalf of this **NGO coalition**. We thank the panelists for their **insightful contributions.**

As a young person myself, I consider it a **responsibility and a right** to speak in this space - where democracy, human rights, and climate justice must come together.

We are living through a defining moment. The climate crisis is not only an environmental emergency, but also a **test of our democracies**. When participation is limited, when accountability is weak, and when fundamental freedoms are restricted, our collective ability to respond to the climate emergency stumbles

To move toward a **climate-just world**, States must ensure that **youth participation** is **effective**, **active**, **and meaningful**. Youth must be empowered to shape climate decisions, not merely comment on them.

Earlier this year, IIMA contributed to the **Call for Inputs** ahead of this Forum, gathering voices from hundreds of young people across 33 countries. Their priorities were clear and remarkably consistent:

They asked for **meaningful participation**, not symbolic consultation - to be part of designing, implementing, and monitoring climate policies.

They called for **greater accountability and transparency**, so that commitments translate into real change, not mere promises.

They demanded **access to quality education and information** on climate action and human rights, to be equipped to contribute effectively.

They urged the protection and recognition of young environmental defenders, whose courage

often meets repression instead of support.

And above all, they asked for **trust** - for institutions that listen and act with integrity.

A truly climate-just world demands courage - the courage to listen, to include, and to be held accountable.

The solutions to the climate crisis will not come from closed rooms, but from **open dialogue**, **shared power**, **and protected freedoms**.
